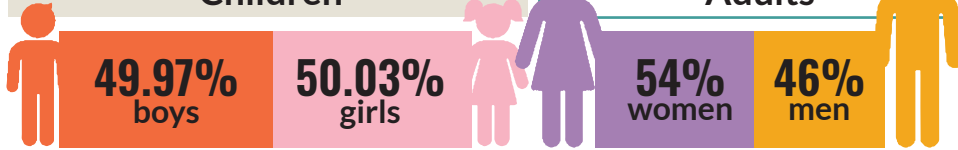

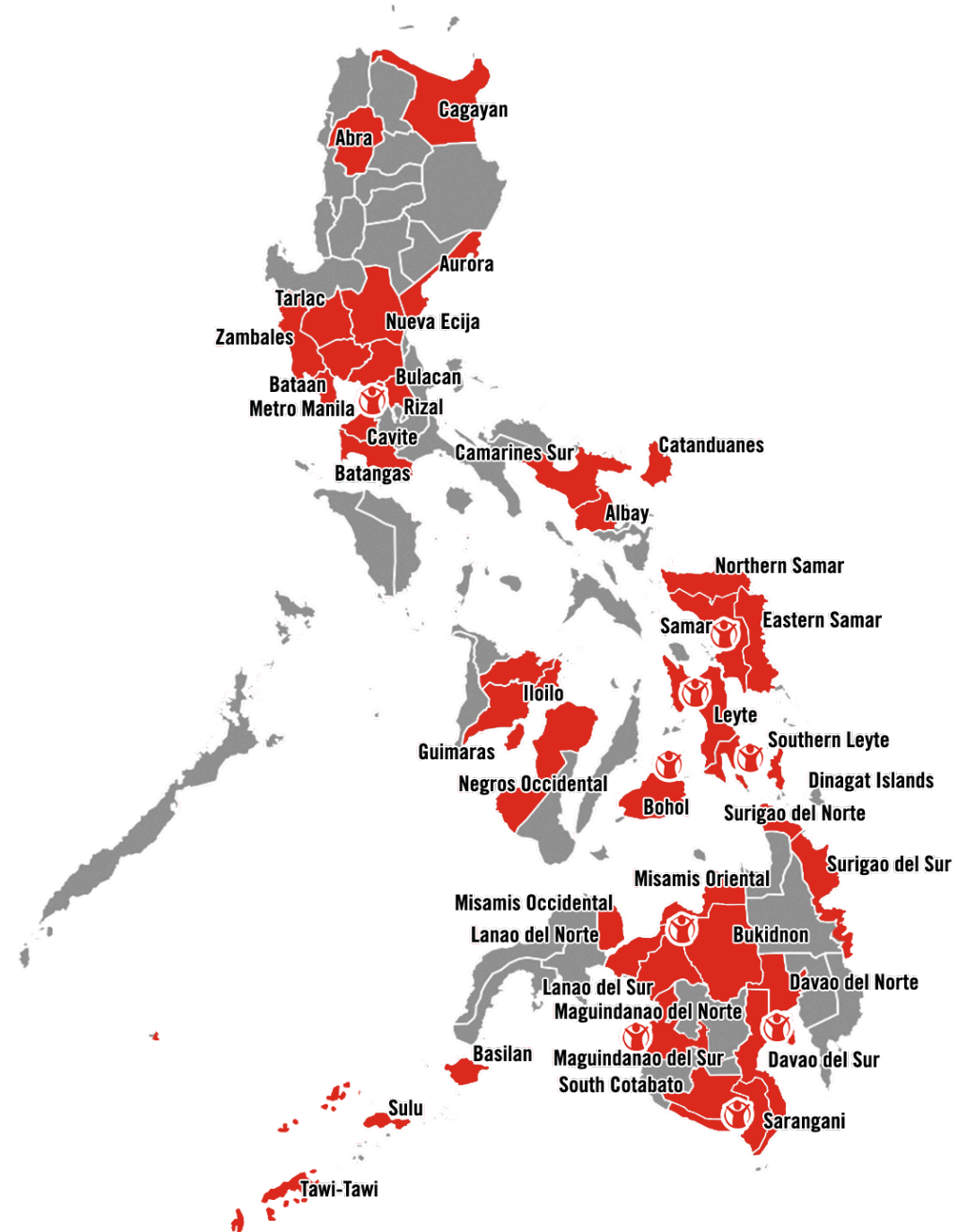

# STRONG BEGINNINGS FOR CHILDREN'S HEALTH

## Health and Nutrition Program Highlights in our Project Areas

The Strong Beginnings for Children's Health Program is anchored on Save the Children's recognition and commitment to providing a healthy start to life to optimize a child's development potential. This is critical for children's long-term health and well-being and educational, social and economic outcomes as adults.

### Positive Deviance (PD)/ Hearth:

**223 trained core leaders** (in urban and rural sponsorship areas) **demonstrated understanding on Positive Deviance (PD) Hearth Plus and Building Brains concepts, children's rights, and positive parenting.**

**63% recovery of children diagnosed as wasted and nutritionally at-risk** (from 49 down to 18) in Samar through the **Nurture 2 and Child-Sensitive Social Protection Projects.**

**100 beneficiaries trained were able to set up their own egg production at home** through the Household Economy and Nutrition Security (HENS) for Children Project.

### Vaccine Solutions:

**3,742 children 5-11 years old, and 1,692 ages 12-17 availed of complete doses of COVID-19 vaccines** in four municipalities in Samar through joint collaboration with the Department of Health (DOH).

**53% directly reached by Project IMPACT** (Improved Immunization Coverage with People's Acceptance Through Communications and Technology) **proceeded to actual vaccination.**

**A prototype Digital Information System for Health (DISH) was developed** and being tested in the local governments of Pasay, Muntinlupa, Tanay and Naic, which will provide data that will generate reports needed by the local government units (LGUs) and the Department of Health, including the coverage for fully-immunized children and pregnant women.

### Safety Nets for Children's Well-being:

**2,500 households received cash assistance**, in urban and rural Sponsorship areas.





## Reaching more children through school-based vaccination

***“Our household is now safe and protected from COVID-19...”***

Sittie, a 40-year-old mother of three children residing in Marawi City, is grateful for the school vaccination caravans that educated them on facts about vaccines. All of her three children have now been vaccinated.

Save the Children Philippines works closely with the local government of Marawi City in implementing routine immunization programs. So far, about 1,400 girls and boys have already received their first dose of COVID-19 vaccine in and out of school.



## A Smile that Melts a Mother's Heart

Merlyn, 45, cries herself to sleep whenever her daughter Marian\* (not her real name), who was diagnosed with Global Development Delay, is experiencing severe toothache.

But their fate shifted for good when Save the Children Philippines' All Kids SHINE (School Health Involvement and Empowerment) Project included her as one of the beneficiaries of the conditional cash transfer program.

Now, she is able to pay for the necessary dental treatments for Marian.

Save the Children Philippines' All Kids SHINE Project provides support to partner schools in Antipolo and Rizal for the health and hygiene needs of children from families living in poverty and in remote areas, including the Dumagat Indigenous Peoples community. It is implemented in partnership with the Mars Wrigley Foundation.

## The Little Jab Book - A Playbook for COVID-19 Vaccination

Save the Children Philippines launched the Little Jab Book Philippines on February 2022 which uncovers underlying reasons for vaccine hesitancy among parents and youth in the Philippines, and identifies localized solutions to increase uptake of the COVID-19 vaccine.

The Little Jab Book was a collaborative work between Save the Children Philippines and Save the Children International's Center for Utilizing Behavioral Insights for Children (CUBIC), and the Common Thread.

**129 individuals proceeded to actual vaccination** after exposure to interventions designed after the playbook.

**The Little Jab Book Philippines became a template** for other Save the Children Country Offices in producing their own playbook for behavioral science-informed solutions against COVID-19.



Save the Children Philippines Ambassador Katarina Rodriguez encouraged attendees during the Little Jab Book Philippines launch to look into the most important barriers to vaccine uptake as addressing the behavioral barriers will be an important step on the road to full vaccination among parents and youth in the Philippines.





## Helping Children, One Coffee Cup at a Time

*“Our journey with Save the Children has been nothing but full of joy. Being able to change the lives of children for the better while doing what I’m most passionate about gives me fulfillment...”*

John Eric Enopia started their café business, The Cooking Dad Bake & Brew, as a mobile store from the back of their car in May 2020. With what little they have, Eric and his wife Sheng, is setting a good example to their children Shayne and Uno, by sharing their blessings to others. For this, they chose Save the Children Philippines as their charity of choice because they want to help ensure that every child has a secure and healthy childhood.

“We figured that Save the Children was the best organization to help spread our advocacy and offer help to children in need,” said Eric.

## Save the Children from Hunger

Save the Children Philippines’ #SaveTheChildrenFromHunger Campaign continued to be a driving force in resource mobilization to support the child rights organization’s health and nutrition programs.

It engaged the public in different and creative means to participate such as the QR for Hunger - an innovative digital movement of Save the Children Philippines. QR for Hunger engaged the public through a simple scan-to-donate feature using creative QR codes and gave people the chance to help “cure” hunger among children.

**A total of Php 2.4 Million was raised locally by supporters of the #SaveTheChildrenFromHunger Campaign in 2022** which provided resources for health and nutrition interventions actions such as providing food baskets to families with malnourished children.

The #QRforHunger garnered the silver medal award for brand effectiveness in Corporate Sustainability and Social Responsibility from the Philippine Association of National Advertisers (PANA).





## Life Changer for Children

Changing Children's Lives for the Better, One Community at a Time



Save the Children Philippines' Life Changer for Children is a community sponsorship program inspired by the spirit of *bayanihan* (communal unity).

Sharing solutions to the challenges to ensure that children are healthy, receive quality education, and are protected at all times, make it easier for communities to act.

The program is currently implemented in communities from Marantao, Lanao del Sur Province, and those of the Bajau ethnic minority in Mindanao, in the south of the Philippines.

### 2022 Program Highlights:

**481 families trained on how to address undernutrition**, and received food baskets as an urgent response.

**813 individuals received support through Cash for Work Program.**

**454 children received Batang Matatag kits and took part in hygiene promotion activities** to raise awareness on health and nutrition.

**One (1) baseline study** conducted on learning among children.

## Miss Universe PH 2022 Celeste Cortesi Finds Purpose in Life Changer for Children

There are millions of children who live in poverty. I hope that it inspires people to help Save the Children Philippines. There's much work to be done and every single person's help matters..."*

Behind Miss Universe Philippines 2022 Celeste Cortesi's beauty is a purpose: to be a transformational advocate who can effectively raise the issues of women and children most impacted by inequality and discrimination.

Celeste has been working with Save the Children Philippines, through the partnership with the Miss Universe Philippines Organization, and shares the advocacy to help children, young girls, and women survive, learn, and be protected at all times. She led the launch of the Life Changer for Children Community Sponsorship Program in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) in December 2022. The program aims to uplift the quality of lives of 3,000 children and their families, and to help address their rights to proper nutrition, health, education, protection and livelihood approaches most suited to their communities.





# LEARNING FOR ALL, AT ALL TIMES: INCLUSIVE EDUCATION FOR A BRIGHTER FUTURE

## Education Program Highlights in our Project Areas

Save the Children Philippines aims to improve learning and development outcomes for children, targeting those most impacted by inequality and discrimination such as children with disabilities, from indigenous communities, informal settlements and resettlement areas, as well as those affected by natural hazards, climate change, and armed conflict.

**37,284 children availed of learning and development opportunities, programs, and services** (33,072 primary school-aged children and 4,212 children aged 0-5 years old).

Of these children reached:

**714 malnourished/ sickly young children benefitted from a nutrition program** integrated with the Building Brains component.

**118 children from conflict-affected areas in Maguindanao showed improvements** in Social and Emotional Learning (SEL), numeracy and literacy skills, knowledge on child protection policies, and protection reporting processes and care services, including psychosocial and mental health support.

**16,808 children, in conflict affected areas** in Lanao del Sur, Maguindanao, and Lanao del Norte, **have access to Return to Learning sessions and infrastructures.**

**50 children with disabilities** (girls: 14 and boys: 36) **received proper development assessment** in partnership with The Medical City.

For parents and caregivers:

**5,751 parents and caregivers gained knowledge and skills** to support their children's access to learning and development.

**Almost 1,000 parents or caregivers** of 2-17-year-old children from urban and rural areas who were not in school, non-readers, or significantly behind in school **have improved knowledge on positive parenting and supporting alternative learning modalities (ALMs).**



# Passage of the Inclusive Education Law

The Republic Act 11650 “An Act Instituting a Policy of Inclusion and Services for Learners with Disabilities in Support of Inclusive Education Law,” was signed into law on 11 March 2022. It safeguards the recognition, protection, and promotion of the rights of all learners with disabilities – whether in school or out of school, to education based on equal opportunity.

Save the Children Philippines’ leadership in the advocacy process and mounting of a campaign for the immediate approval of the bill provided the strategic engagement of different stakeholders - from the meaningful participation of children and their families to constituency building that resulted in the passage of the bill.

An important feature of this law is that all learners with disability cannot be denied access to educational opportunities. It will also provide learners with disabilities with additional resources to support their holistic education needs that include, among others, inclusive learning resource centers featuring multidisciplinary teams of professionals, accessible materials, child find systems, public awareness raising, consultative mechanisms, family education, pre- and in-service professional development for teachers and child development workers, and an advisory council.

Save the Children Philippines ensured that the voices of children and civils society organizations were reflected in the draft Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of the Inclusive Education Law through its submission of the results of the children’s and stakeholders’ consultations it conducted to the Department of Education (DepEd) which is now used as working document in the ongoing IRR development.

## Why a Teacher Cannot Stop Learning

Nonoy Guardian is a Master Teacher 1 of Sorsogon East Central School and a Receiving Teacher for the visually-impaired and hearing-impaired learners.

His routine life changed for the better when he trained under the Sustaining Education Reform and Gains (SERG) Project, funded by the Australian Government and implemented by Save the Children Philippines together with the Department of Education to support the learning and development of teachers. Now, Nonoy has transformed into an exuberant Learning and Development Facilitator and is already coaching other teachers in capacity building sessions.

## Valuable Life Lessons of a Mother and Daughter

*“I remember we watched cartoons from Big Bad Boo where we learned many moral lessons. There were two genies trapped in a lamp because they did something bad. I learned that whenever we do something bad, there will be consequences...”*

Cali (not her real name) was having some challenges when she started attending in-person classes during the pandemic. But she is glad that her school showcased the animated series 1001 Nights as part of their curriculum so they can learn in a fun and creative way.

“This project is very useful for us, for the children. As a parent who ensures that my children grow with respect and kindness. This material is very helpful for us to achieve that goal,” said Cali’s mother, Reyleyn.

The 1001 Nights: Animating Change Project was supported by the Embassy of Canada and Big Bad Boo Studios in partnership with Save the Children Philippines.







# INCREASING PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM ALL FORMS OF HARM

## Protection Program Highlights in our Project Areas

The Batang Protektado at Ligtas (Child Protected and Safe) Program aims to contribute to increased protection of children from all forms of harm, specifically to:

- (1) Strengthen children's resilience and capacity to protect themselves;
- (2) Improve parents' and caregivers' capacity to protect and support their children;
- (3) Build community support for children's protection from all forms of risks; and
- (4) Increase the availability and accessibility of government programs and services to prevent and mitigate risks.

**73 children were trained as peer facilitators** to conduct workshops with children on the UN Convention for the Rights of the Child, Child Protection, and Online Safety.

**50 Community Support Groups (CSGs) were engaged to support local mechanisms** for protecting children from priority risks.

**907 children accessed social protection services** from the provision of Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) - Assistance to Individual in Crisis Situation (AICS).

**5,434 children availed complete dose of COVID-19 vaccine** through joint collaboration with the Department of Health PINASLAKAS Campaign.

**370 parents and community support groups trained on Immunization and Positive Parenting.**

**54 parents enrolled in the Positive Discipline in Everyday Parenting Course.**

**501 parents from urban informal settlement sites were capacitated** in child-centered budgeting and positive parenting.

**171 households received cash for learning assistance** under the Protect Children PH Project.

**PhP 400M (USD 7.4M) was allocated for the protection of children in schools** including learners with disabilities, prevention of worst forms of child labor, and the monitoring of child protection plans and program implementation at the national level, through partnership with Social Watch Philippines.

**The "Ranao Mental Health" Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) ordinance was drafted** and already in its first reading in the province of Lanao Del Sur. Once approved, it will be mainstreamed in the 39 municipalities in Lanao Del Sur for MHPSS programs and budget support that will benefit communities, adults, and children.





## Purificacion Learns How to Raise Her Kids in Love Instead of Guilt

***“My guilt over not having enough food, enough money, and enough resources to provide for my children has made me a cruel and unreasonable parent. The Protect Children PH Project helped me see the errors of my ways. My children are my life. I learned that my relationship with them is better when I raise them in love...”***

Purificacion is one of the beneficiaries of the livelihood support program under Save the Children Philippines’ Protect Children PH Project in Tagum City. Under the program, she was able to start life again with the capital provided for her banana business. She and her children also participated in community-wide learning sessions where children’s rights, protection, and positive parenting were explained and discussed. Purificacion also realized that the livelihood program gave her the means to provide for her children who would otherwise become vulnerable to online sexual abuse and exploitation of children (OSAEC) rampant in their area.

Save the Children Philippines has already trained more than 10,000 children and more than 200 parents in Child Rights, Child Protection, and OSAEC prevention and response.



# Passage of Laws Protecting Children from Sexual Abuse, Exploitation, and Increasing the Age to Determine Statutory Rape

The signing into law of Republic Act 11648 “An Act Providing for Stronger Protection Against Rape and Sexual Exploitation and Abuse, Increasing the Age for Determining the Commission of Statutory Rape” addresses the limitations of the Anti-Rape Law of 1997 and increased the age to determine statutory rape from 12 to 16 years old. Save the Children Philippines actively lobbied for the passage of the law along with children and other civil society organizations.

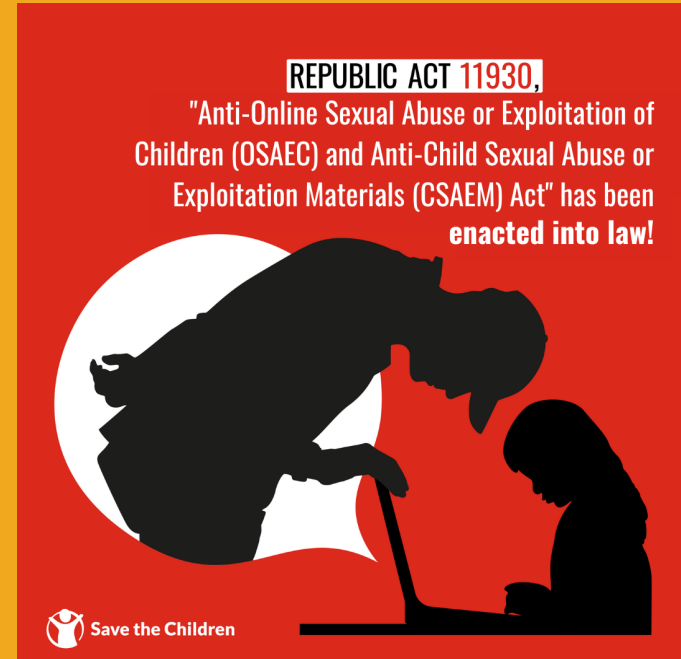


With the passage of this law, the Philippines, as State Party to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) and the UN Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), has complied with the recommendations of the Committees of both Treaties to increase the age of sexual consent to protect children from sexual abuse.

The passage of “Republic Act No. 11930 Anti-Online Sexual Abuse or Exploitation of Children (OSAEC) and Anti-Child Sexual Abuse or Exploitation Materials (CSAEM) Act” positions the Philippines as one of the first countries in the Asia and the Pacific Region to have an institutionalized and collaborative approach to prevention and response against online sexual abuse and exploitation of children.

Save the Children Philippines advocated for the passage of the Anti-OSAEC Bill where it contributed to the: 1) analysis and review of existing laws providing children protection from OSAEC; 2) submission of recommendations to Congress on how to enhance child protection from OSAEC such as the inclusion of awareness raising, prevention, rehabilitation, and reintegration of programs to support victims and survivors of OSAEC, and addressing the gaps identified in the policy review conducted on existing OSAEC related laws, and 3) active participation in Technical Working Group meetings to develop the law.

Save the Children Philippines is currently implementing Anti-OSAEC Projects with Westpac Australia and Saferkids PH, a consortium composed of The Asia Foundation, UNICEF, and Save the Children Philippines in partnership with the Australian Embassy. These Projects focus on awareness raising, prevention, and provision of intervention programs to assist families and children who are vulnerable and/ or are victims of OSAEC. These Projects work closely with children, local government units (LGUs), parents, and other stakeholders in four (4) cities and one (1) municipality in Mindanao, and in two (2) cities in the National Capital Region (NCR).



## Program and Advocacy Highlights:

As of December 2022, around **100 cases** (sexual abuse, physical abuse, children engaged in hazardous work) were referred and being responded to by capacitated duty bearers across target areas.

**984 parents and caregivers** were orientated on child rights, child protection, positive parenting, and online sexual abuse and exploitation of children (OSAEC).

**81 media personalities** from Davao City, Tagum City, General Santos City, and Bukidnon province participated in the media forum on OSAEC conducted by civil society partner, Talikala.

**Recommendations of children were incorporated in the Implementing Rules and Regulations of RA 11930.**

**Three (3) local ordinances on OSAEC prevention and response were developed.**



## Positive Parenting Campaign

Save the Children Philippines is campaigning to increase the public acceptance and demand for parents, guardians, caregivers, and the community towards the practice of Positive Parenting for their children.

Its digital campaign **#PwedengPD** is popularizing the concept of Positive Discipline (PD) by harnessing a community of PD practitioners supportive of the cause. It is complemented by **“The Pinoy Parent”** - a publication site that intends to help young Filipino parents become more knowledgeable and more supportive when it comes to their children by providing practical ideas on positive parenting.

The Positive Parenting Campaign is also embedded in protection programs to promote behavior change on the non acceptance of physical and humiliating punishment and the practice of non-violent forms of discipline to teach and guide children, families, schools, and communities.

Successes from these interventions support the lobbying for the enactment of the Positive Parenting Bill currently filed in Congress.

### Campaign Highlights:

**At least six (6) recommendations by 73 adolescent children from 18 child-led groups from select cities in Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao were considered in the draft Positive Parenting Bill.**

**Six (6) legislators and their staff were oriented on the effects of physical and humiliating punishments on children and the need to support the legal prohibition.**

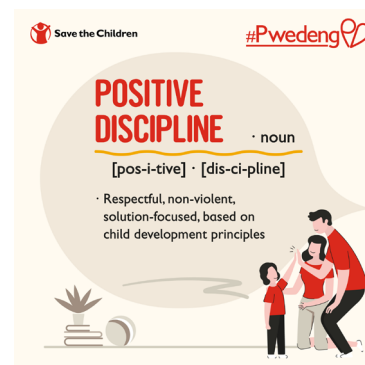

## Red Alert Campaign

In 2022, Save the Children Philippines implemented the Red Alert on Climate Campaign with the support of Save the Children Sweden and Söderberg & Partners to:

1. Enhance children's and youth's understanding of climate change and its impacts;
2. Mobilize children and youth to participate in climate action;
3. Popularize children's voices in demanding accountability and immediate action from the government and businesses to mitigate the impacts of the climate crisis.

### Campaign Highlights:

**200 children and youth, and two (2) child-led groups were informed of climate change and its impacts, and participated in six (6) learning sessions and several activities on key environment moments.**

**12 child-led Red Alert campaign plans developed.**

**2.9 Million Total Reach** across traditional and digital media to popularize the issue of the impact of climate change on children.

## Filipino Children's Call for Climate Action Heard at G20 and COP27 Summits

November 2022 - The call to action to world leaders of some 50 Filipino children, including children with disability, and environment advocates expressed through a 10-meter mural art was paraded in Jakarta in time for the #G20Indonesia summit while its highlights were also featured at the COP27 in Egypt.

# DISASTER RISK REDUCTION AND MANAGEMENT

Children and child-led groups were capacitated on risks, children's rights, child protection, online safety, Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR), climate change, and protection mechanisms, which resulted to their active participation in school and community activities including risk identification, peer mentoring, child-centered social accountability, information sharing, and advocacy.

A total of 327 children in 30 schools were trained on children's rights and basic concepts of Disaster Risk Reduction using the Batang Empowered and Resilient (BERT) Modules, and conducted the student-led school watching and hazard mapping using the DRR Management Information System-School Watching Application (SWApp) in Region III.

62 children ages 10-17 actively engaged in the Children's DRR Summit 2022, by sharing their learnings and insights on their role in climate change adaptation and Disaster Risk Reduction and Management in community and schools.

National adoption of the enhanced Barangay Disaster Risk Reduction Management Plan/ Committee (BDRRMP/C) with the inclusion of health indicators (NDRRMC MC No. 03, s.2022: Adoption and Utilization of the Enhanced Quality Assurance System for BDRRMP/C).

154 barangays capacitated to use the new Quality Assurance System.

59 DRR and Emergency Response Plans (ERP) developed in seven (7) municipalities, six (6) barangays/communities, 43 schools, and three (3) madrassahs in Eastern Visayas, Central Luzon and Maguindanao.

## Save the Children Philippines wins 2022 UN SASAKAWA Award

Save the Children Philippines wins the prestigious UN SASAKAWA Award for its innovative programs on disaster risk reduction and management (DRRM) that support Filipino children's meaningful participation and protection from emergencies.

The 2022 UN SASAKAWA Award, which promotes inclusive and accessible DRR practices in line with the Sendai Framework, recognized Save the Children's Comprehensive School Safety (CSS) Ecosystems and Quality Assurance System (QAS) programs that have been rolled out to more than 21,000 schools and 12,000 barangays, respectively, to ensure that the vital needs of children, schools, and communities are addressed with responsive programs and accountability from the government.

Save the Children Philippines' CSS Ecosystems program uses technology to help develop the Department of Education's (DepEd) DRR information system by combining digital tools for data collection, analysis, planning, and decision-making.

This includes the Rapid Assessment of Damages Report (RADaR) Mobile App, a reporting mechanism which assesses the needs of schools, personnel, and learners, and the Batang Empowered and Resilient Team (BERT), a peer-to-peer capacity building program empowering children to participate in school and community DRR programs and engage with government/ duty-bearers. The program has already trained 10,000 learners.

Meanwhile, Save the Children's QAS supports risk-informed and responsive Barangay DRRM plans through standardized planning tools, quality benchmarks, and technology for data consolidation and info-sharing. More than 42,000 barangays will be using QAS for their DRRM template.

Save the Children Philippines works with the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), Office of Civil Defense (OCD), and other government agencies for the QAS for Barangay DRRM Planning, and with the DepEd and Prudence Foundation for the CSS Ecosystems program.

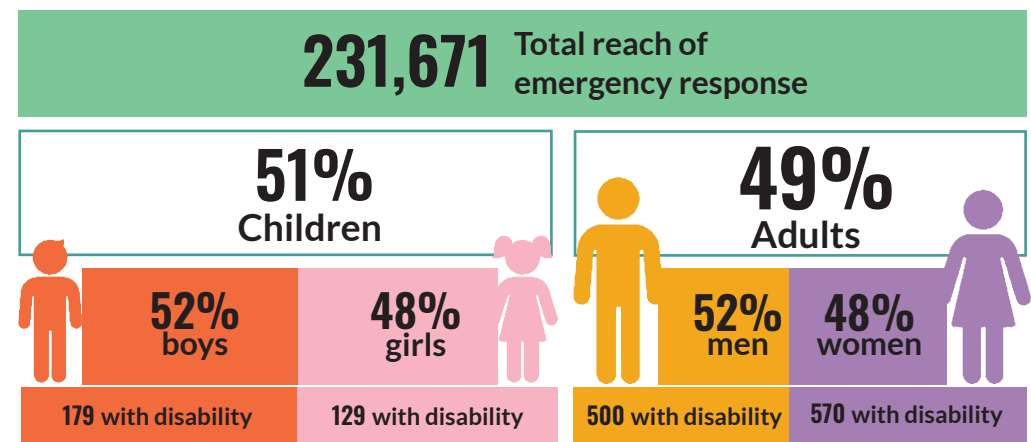

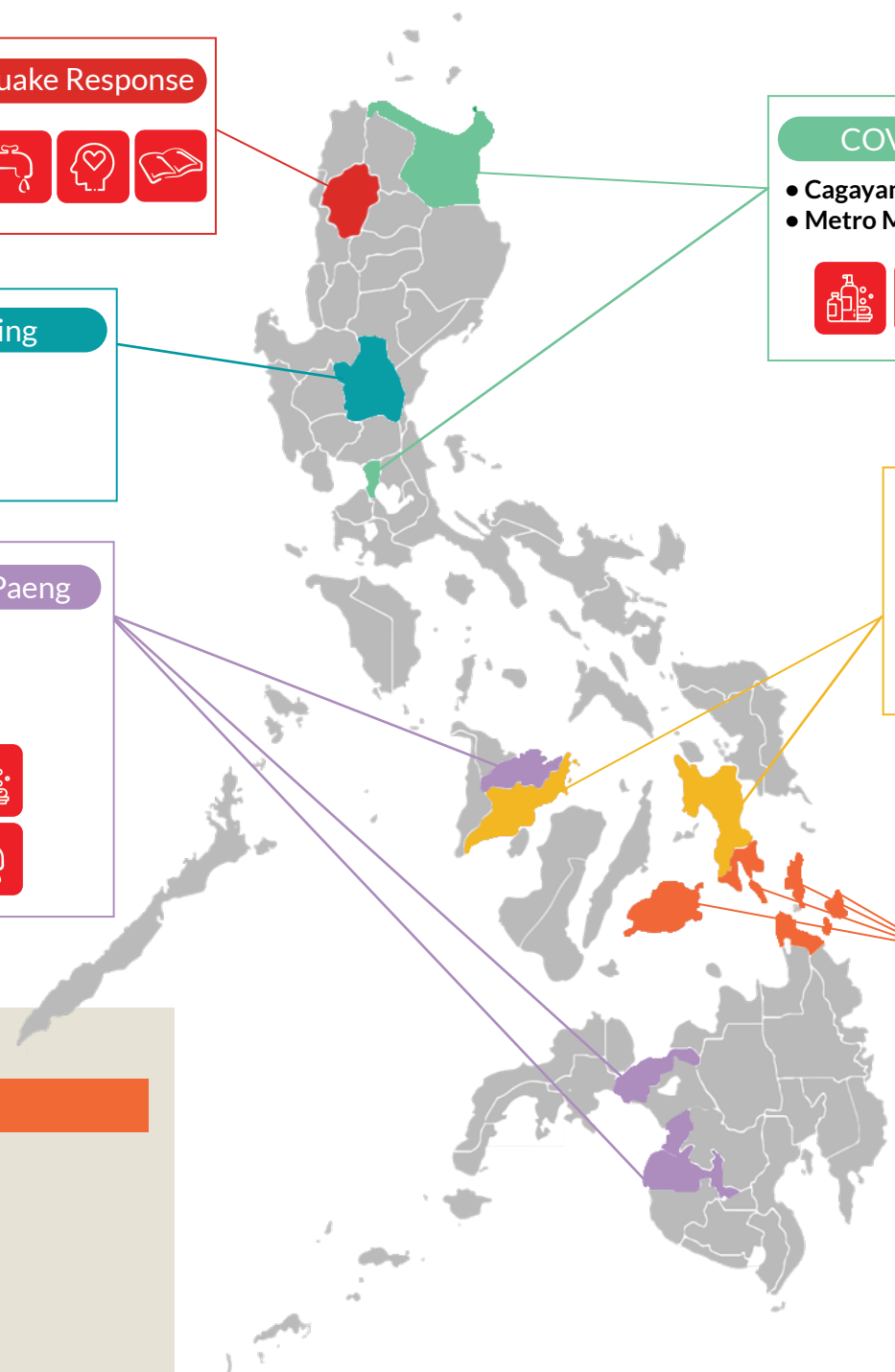

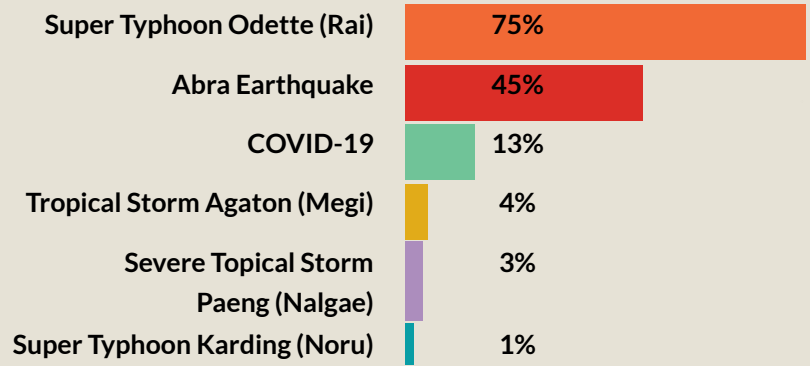

## Save the Children Philippines Cradles Young Dreams Inspired by Humanitarian Response

***“I want to be a soldier someday...”***

Pablo (not his real name) braved the muddy waters and howling winds using a rickety raft to help save his aunt who lived nearby. Pablo is a 5th grade learner in Maguindanao. He was one of the 1.9M in the list of children affected by Severe Tropical Storm Paeng (international name: Nalgae). It was also in this encounter with Save the Children Philippines' Humanitarian Response Team, who set up the temporary learning spaces in his school, that his dream to be a soldier was set aflame.

“Because of the typhoon, many children in the community feel troubled. But psychosocial activities in the learning spaces really made us feel better. We lost our books and bags but thanks to Save the Children, we have new school bags and school supplies. I'm excited now to go back to school and study!”

Seeing how selfless Save the Children Philippines responded to help many people, despite the crisis, made him feel that there is more he can do. His desire to do something meaningful for his fellow Filipinos led him to dream of becoming a soldier - so he could help people, including children like him, when disaster strikes again.



## You Came at the Time We Needed the Most

***“I am beyond grateful to Save the Children for reaching our far community. Save the Children came when we needed them the most...”***

Never did Helen think that on the morning of July 27, 2022, she and her family would have to abandon their home at the mountainside of Barangay Suyo, Pidigan, Abra, because of the magnitude 7.0 earthquake that struck and caused massive damages to the northern part of the Philippines. It was around the peak of the rainy season, which posed all the more risks such as landslides and poor evacuation conditions to the affected population.

Save the Children mobilized its emergency response team and reached Helen's family within 48 hours after the earthquake. They received essential items that helped them get through the rainy days while in evacuation, especially with an infant in tow. They were able to take shelter, prepare healthy meals, store clean water, and clean themselves.





# WITH US: CHILDREN'S VOICE IN GOVERNANCE

## Child Participation and Child Rights Governance Program Highlights in our Project Areas

The KASAMA KAMI: Children's Voice in Governance Program aims to build children's capacity to engage governance processes and influence key decisions affecting their sector, targeting children most impacted by inequality and discrimination (i.e. Indigenous girl children, children with disabilities, children affected by conflict, disasters and by the anti-illegal drugs campaign).

**Around 3,879 children and youth, ages 12-17, across 54 children and youth groups were supported in their priority agenda.**

**4,012 children from 182 barangays and 116 child-led groups (CLGs) have demonstrated increased knowledge on child rights and meaningful child participation.**

**108 CLGs were capacitated and mobilized for child participation activities at the national, sub-national, and local levels.**

**Six (6) CLGs provided with Citizenship Funds enabled them to strengthen their organizational capacities and implement projects and advocacies that are relevant to their concerns.**

**Two (2) children were appointed as members of the Municipal Feedback and Comment Response Mechanism in the municipalities of Dolores and Sulat, Eastern Samar.**

**Recommendations by 33 CLGs on budgets for adolescent hubs and psychosocial activities in Bahay Pag-Asa, programs for teenage pregnancy, support for children with disabilities, and the integration of the Lanao Youth Development Plan to the Lanao del Sur Vision 2040 were included by local government units (LGUs) in their local plans and budgets.**

**Children, including children with disabilities and of diverse gender identities, co-designed activities, projects, and proposals on 1) Government Officials Knowledge Information Tools (GOKIT), 2) CityZen Mobile Game App on Local Governance, and 3) Makabatang Tindahan.**

**Children's recommendations were included in the revised Dangerous Drugs Board protocol on Handling Children Allegedly Involved in Dangerous Drugs.**

**Four (4) core youth groups in Lanao del Sur were established and strengthened and are actively participating in the Ranaw Youth Parliament (RYP).**

**13 children trained on Child Centered Social Accountability (CCSA) from Saranggani, Caloocan City, and Navotas City were elected/ appointed as child representatives in their respective city and municipal councils.**

**117 children from six (6) elementary schools, six (6) Madaris (Muslim schools) and six (6) barangays in Maguindanao participated in the development of the Child Protection Policy and Code of Conduct in their respective schools and communities.**

**18 Children's Advisory Teams (ChATs) were established in 13 areas and are composed of children from urban/ rural poor, indigenous and disaster/conflict-prone communities. ChATs provide feedback on Save the Children Philippines' programming and advocacies, and serve as a platform for children in sharing their issues, concerns, and recommendations to duty bearers.**



## Blind but with a Clear Vision in Life

*“It is important for children and youth with disabilities like me to learn that we have rights like every other child. We need to be able to participate in different activities so we can also share with children and youth without disabilities our experiences. This will help build an inclusive society...”*

Jessica is a youth with visual impairment who has become a youth leader and representative of children with disabilities through the support of the EU-funded Project SCOPE (Strengthening the Capacity of Organizations of Persons with Disabilities and Other Civil Society Organizations Towards Effective Civil Society-Local Government Engagement and Improved Government Accountability for Persons with Disabilities, Especially Children in the Cities of Parañaque and Taguig, and Municipality of Pateros).

She is grateful for the opportunities that the SCOPE Project opened for her where she is able to participate in various consultations and continues to raise awareness on disability inclusion.

## Becoming a Better Person and an Advocate of Children’s Rights

*“I was very happy that I participated in the Youth Resilience Program because it helped me to explore, learn more things, and know myself better. It helped boost my self-confidence. Now, I am confident to speak up and recognize that I have the right to speak and express my opinions..”*

Jaypee, is a 12th grade student from Leyte. Growing up, he was a shy kid who was afraid to express his ideas. But just over two years ago, he was elected as President of their Barangay Children’s Association after participating in Save the Children Philippines’ YRP and Child Centered Social Accountability (CCSAC) training!

“I am grateful to Save the Children for implementing YRP in our barangay because it had a big impact on me as a person and I would like to share this to other children in my community,” said Jaypee.

The BATA MUNA (CHILD FIRST) CAMPAIGN was a child/ youth-led nationwide initiative supported by Save the Children Philippines together with the Ateneo Human Rights Center, the Child Rights Network, and civil society organization partners in Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao. It became a platform for children to meaningfully participate and demand accountability from public officials and political candidates for the fulfilment of their rights.

**Campaign Highlights:**

Children developed the Children's 15-point Electoral Agenda which they recommended for consideration of the candidates of the May 2022 Philippine National Elections.

300 children participated in nationwide consultations and 152 children from 31 child-led organizations participated in the national-level Bata Muna Congress.

At least six (6) election candidates agreed/ signed a commitment to advocate for the children's electoral agenda.

The Philippine House Committee on the Welfare of Children (19th Congress) committed to prioritize the children's agenda during the National Children's Month.

159 children trained to lobby for their priority issues and capacitated to advocate for the children's rights and electoral agenda.

Children's recommendations were considered in the 1) Inclusive Education Law Implementing Rules and Regulations, and 2) Positive Parenting Bill.

1.3 Million Total Reach across traditional and digital media in the promotion of the BATA MUNA Children's Electoral Agenda.

## Traditional Media reach: 33 Million

Save the Children Philippines' top media topics in 2022 were related to the calls and passage of Republic Act (R.A.) 11648 "An Act Providing for Stronger Protection Against Rape and Sexual Exploitation and Abuse, Increasing the Age for Determining the Commission of Statutory Rape" and R.A. 11650 "An Act Instituting a Policy of Inclusion and Services for Learners with Disabilities in Support of Inclusive Education Law." These media engagements helped amplify our position and commitment in fulfilling children's rights to education and protection.



## Digital Media reach: 16 Million

Save the Children Philippines' social media posts with the highest engagement in 2022 were mostly about the #SaveTheChildrenFromHunger Campaign which helped mobilize resources to support our programs in health and nutrition, raise awareness on the issue of hunger and malnutrition, and demand for accountability and action from duty-bearers and the general public.

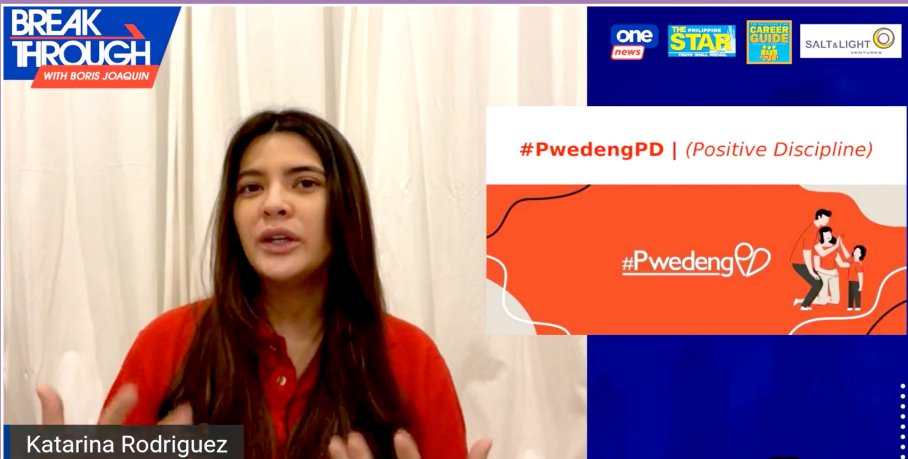




Save the Children Philippines Ambassadors Liza Soberano and Katarina Rodriguez led the launch of the QR for Hunger under the #SaveTheChildrenFromHunger Campaign to engage people to take action in addressing the rising hunger and malnutrition among children in the Philippines. They were able to raise a total of PHP 1.4 Million.



Save the Children Philippines child Ambassador Xia Vigor was elected as Save the Children Asia Region Vice President of the Red Alert Steering Committee. She actively led the Red Alert Campaign on Climate as well as the Children’s Dialogue where the children’s agenda was accepted as a priority by the members of the 19th Congress’ Committee on the Welfare of Children (CWC).



Katarina also campaigned for Positive Parenting in the program “Breakthrough with Boris Joaquin” streamed live on the Philippine STAR Facebook page last November 2022. She rallied parents and communities to stop the practice of physical and humiliating punishment among children which was a priority advocacy highlighted on the National Children’s Month.

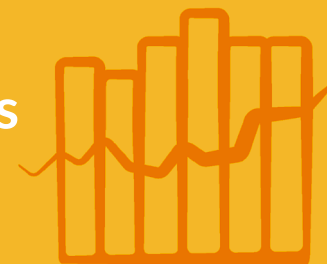

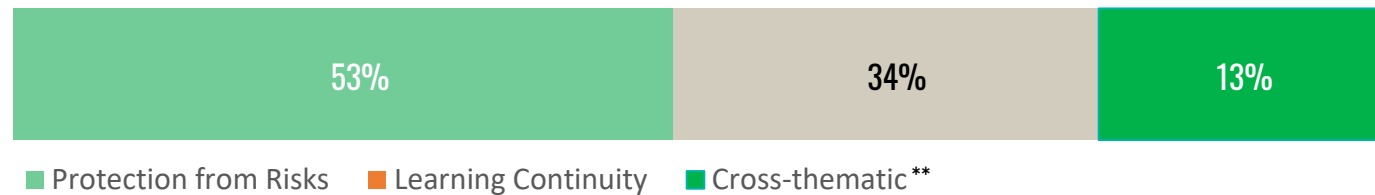
